### FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Dear Parents and Community Members,

Albany Options School is an alternative high school and GED preparation and testing site in GAPS. Students come to us by choice or through referral. AOS provides an opportunity for students to experience academic success in a non-threatening, non-traditional setting. Our staff attempts to engage students each day in meaningful learning that allows students to achieve growth, both academically and socially. We use a variety of instructional strategies and methodology focusing on the Rigor, Relevance and Relationships in the classroom.

### Key Successes during the 2013-2014 school year:

We implemented Essential Skills classes for Reading, Writing and Math interventions. This has helped improve the graduation rate. We have aligned the curriculum to the state standards and the CCSS. This has allowed teachers to become more aware of what they are teaching and how it meets the state standards. We participated in professional development which included increasing student engagement strategies in the classroom with a focus on students of poverty. Also, we have created Peer to Peer Teacher Observations/Learning Walks. Both have raised teacher awareness to meet individual student and whole group needs for learning. We have extended the school day to increase student contact, learning and

increased credit opportunities by adding two and three quarter hours to the school schedule.

### Priorities for the 2014-2015 school year:

We will continue with Essential Skills intervention classes in Reading, Writing and Math. We will continue to align the curriculum with the CCSS. We will continue our professional development with strategies to increase student engagement in the classroom. We will continue with our Peer to Peer Observation and teacher Learning Walks. We will continue an extended day schedule and increase learning opportunity through Summer School and Service Learning.

We are committed to your students and have pledged to deliver the best possible education you expect from our high school. You can help by monitoring your student's daily homework, attending parent teacher conferences, or volunteering at AOS. We look forward to partnering with you over the coming year to make sure all of our students reach their potential.



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**Priority Schools** are high poverty schools that were ranked in the bottom 5% of Title I-A schools in the state based on Oregon's rating formula. These schools generally have overall very low achievement and limited growth over time. Additional supports and interventions to make improvements are needed.

Priority and Focus school designations were based on 2011-12 data. Model school designations were based on 2013-14 data.
