## Service Learning in New Ecology Class

Exciting things will be happening in our new Ecology class starting March 19th involving large Service Learning projects.

Our school garden, which has been in the forefront of everyone's attention will be a main focus in that class. Students will get to visit other successful school gardens such as the National award-winning College Hill High School horticulture program. Students will get to germinate seeds and transplant them into the beds out in the garden, grow a variety of fruits and vegetables, and of course grow beautiful and colorful flowers.

The class will also be working outdoors with the Bioswale on our school grounds. The swale collects all of the rain from the roof of the school building and filters it before it goes into our rivers and waterways. It also helps to minimize the impact on our watershed when there is a heavy rain. Students will learn about how it works, and develop the swale so that is functions more efficiently and effectively. This will be an exciting hands-on opportunity to apply knowledge from the classroom to the real world in a way that directly benefits our community.

The third project that will be done in this class will be turning AOS into an Oregon Certified Green School. Students will go through the necessary steps and applications in order for the school to become a "green" school. Steps will include building awareness, reducing waste, increasing programs such as recycling and composting, and learning about the amount of waste, water, and energy used in the school everyday.

## US History Class Dives into the 1920's

Albany Options' US History class brought history to life when they interviewed residents at Regency of Albany Rehabilitation Center. After spending a few weeks learning about what life was like during the Roaring Twenties, twelve students headed next door to the assisted living home to get a personal take on what life was like during that time. Sitting side by side in the family room at Regency of

Albany, small groups were able to begin a conversation with three different residents about what their childhood was like and how life has changed since. The students were able to get a special insight into the past hearing about times without electricity, having to milk cows before and after school, limited education, migration, and times of war. Spending time with these amazing people who have lived

through so much not only brought a personal aspect to history for these

students but allowed them to experience how entertaining and valuable the elderly can be.



## Rotary Club Honoree

On March 20th Debra Leonor was honored by the Rotary Club of Albany as their Student of the Month. Students are selected based on their service and involvement in the community. Debra volunteers for Mid-Valley Gleaners in Albany and Habitat for Humanity ReStore.
