A Word from the Principal

I hope everyone had a great Spring Break with friends and family! I took the opportunity to visit my son in Montana for a few days. It was nice to spend some time enjoying beautiful scenery and relaxing. Of course, I missed all of the AOS students during this time.

The school year is moving along quickly as we are down to 9-weeks left before we depart for summer!

As the weather improves, sometimes our students have the urge to not attend school. This can have disastrous consequences. With our short 6-week grading periods, a couple of missed days can negatively impact a students' ability to pass their classes. We want to encourage our students to be here every day.

This trimester we as a staff decided to change a few things up in our schedule.

What are some of these changes you ask?

#1: Two early morning classes that begin an hour before our regular start time of 10:15 have been added. The two classes are art and yoga. Both classes are full and attendance has been

amazing each day, averaging over 90%!

#2: We have added a Junior Seminar class that has blocked all our junior students into 3rd period to do preparation for the new SMARTER BAL-

#5: Due to popular demand our Running class from the fall is back this spring with Mr. Wolfe! We are now discussing having an AOS Cross Country Team next fall, which would be our first organized sports team at the school!

#6: Mrs. Harryman's Horticulture students will be working within a new program called NCRC. It will earn them a National Career Readiness Certificate that gives them a competitive edge to stand out amongst others by demonstrating the skills employees need.

As you can see we have lots of exciting things happening at AOS! The

above mentioned are just a sampling of MANY great things occurring this 12-weeks.

As we move towards the end of the school year, I will be speaking with senior students, pushing them along to achieve their goal of graduation. If you have a senior, or any student, really push them to stay on course and finish up strong.

Horticulture Class Partners with Sunrise Garden Club

Spring is officially upon us, as is clearly seen out in the Horticulture class greenhouse.

Students have been spending their

class periods outside constantly planting seeds and transplanting starts into progressively larger pots or out into the garden.

The little greenhouse is unable to hold too many plants, so the students have been putting their woodworking

skills to use and building more shelving for the greenhouse. As a result the class is

able to produce even more starts in preparation for the warmer weather

As the class continues producing waves of new starts, we have been able to partner

with our neighbors across the street, Sunrise Elementary School, and pro-

vide starts for their Garden Club program.

The Horticulture program is also able to sell starts for \$1 for each 4 inch pot start. If you are planning on growing a garden this year come check out the starts in our garden. All proceeds

go directly back into the program to pay for supplies.
