some this will be a new addition to their schedule and a longer day, for others is will be the same.

As we finished up the trimester we held our conferences through the 26th. Many of you came to speak with your student's teachers about their progress. It was wonderful getting to meet so many of you.

## Guest Speakers Visit AOS

On Monday, November 18th AOS students met with two guest speakers from the Boys and Girls Club and from Jackson Street Youth Shelter's Cornerstone program in Albany.

Mat Heady, the Teen and Athletic Director for Boys

and Girls Club spoke about the new facilities including an indoor soccer field, game and sports facilities, homework and study areas. He also discussed the Keystone Club, their tutoring services, opportunities for volunteering, internships, and field trips.

Melissa Hartwig, the Lead Case Manager for Linn County with Jackson Street gave information about the shelter for young people ages 18-20, transitional housing, the Cornerstone program in Albany for youth under 19, independent living programs, and job building skills.

## Important Information

### **DRIVER'S LICENSE**

Students wishing to get their **driver's license** will not receive their proof of enrollment from the school unless they have at least 80% attendance and are earning all passing grades.

## SENIORS: Grad Requirement - Youth Job Fair

Every year all of the high school seniors in Linn County meet at LBCC for the annual Youth Job Fair, which is a **graduation requirement** for all students.

This year the event will be on **December 17th from 9:00am-12:30pm**, which means an early start to the day for most of our seniors. All seniors are required to participate in this event as part of their career education requirements.

The event is made up of three parts, the keynote speaker, career and edu-

cation booths, and the mock interviews. Professionals from the community volunteer their time to interview the students and give them realistic feedback to help prepare them for the workforce.

Students will be expected to have completed copies of their resume and copies of the provided job application at that time, and to come prepared for the event dressed professionally and appropriately.

During the course of the next month the teachers and staff at AOS will be working with the students to prepare them

for this fun and exciting event.

Resume information and the formatted document is posted on the AOS website under the section titled, "FORMS."

Students should begin to assemble a professional outfit to wear for the occasion. Appropriate clothes include slacks, knee-length skirts, button-down shirts, blazers, ties, and dress shoes. See Ms. Smith or Ms. Sokolov for any assistance.

Sign-up to chat with our counselor, Ms. Smith, to discuss opportunities and options for you.

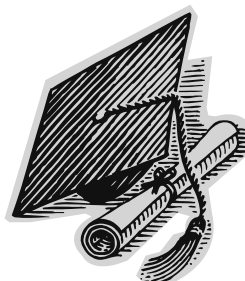
This is the time of year we begin focusing on scholarships and awards for college. If you are interested in attending LBCC or a four-year col-

lege next year let her know so she can keep you in mind as we begin to nominate students. Make sure to pay attention to the scholarship board to see if anything is relevant to you.

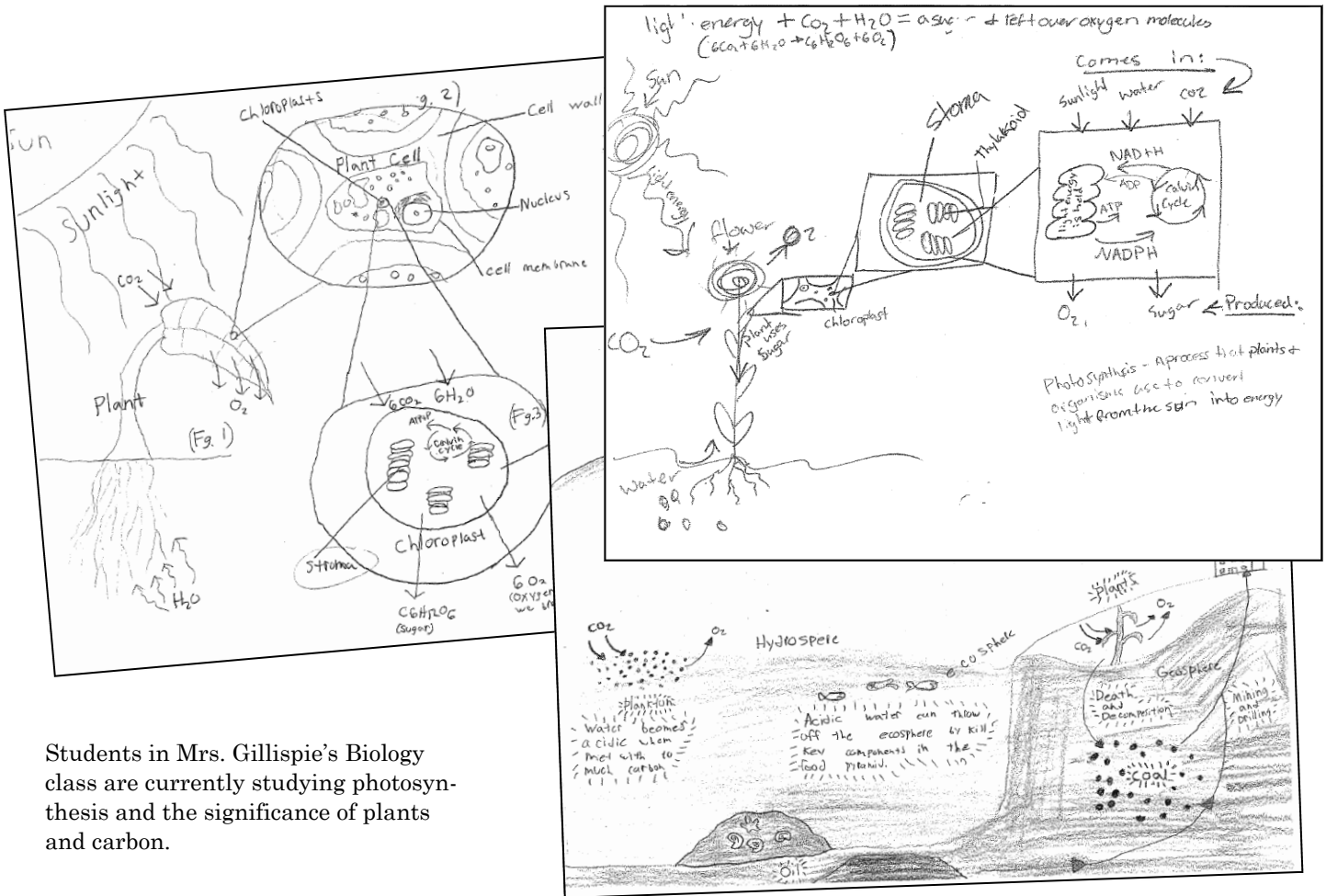
If college is something you are interested in or maybe you are unsure, we take students on visits to check

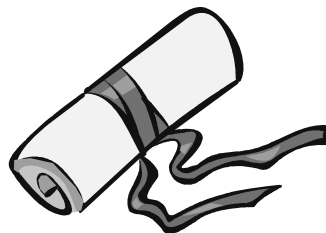

Students spent the second Service Saturday attending the Volunteer Orientation at Safe Haven Humane Society. Students learned the rules for the shelter, how to handle the pets,

and signed up to return as regular volunteers. Students can use their volunteer hours to earn up to 1.0 Elective Credits this school year.

teer at the Christmas Story Book Land on Saturday, December 21st. That day we will be helping to take down all of the scenes and decorations. Lunch will be provided to those who attend.
