English Class Gathers Supplies for Safe Haven Humane Society

This term Miss Kozak's English class read a book called "Straydog." This book depicts the story of an angry, withdrawn teenager who attempts to save a stray dog. While reading the book Miss Kozak arranged to have a representative from Safe Haven Humane Society come to AOS and speak to the class.

Following the guest speaker, students took two class trips out to Safe Haven to play with animals and learn more about shelter. Safe Haven is a non-profit, no-kill shelter that serves Albany. From July 2010 to June 2011 Safe Haven has saved 1, 539 animals and in the past 35 years they have saved 20,000 dogs.

With the down economy Safe Haven has more animals than ever. In an effort to support the animals that are saved and kept at Safe Haven while waiting for their "forever" homes the students at AOS are having a coin drive competition and supplies collection.

Two collection jars have been placed a the front of the school; one for dogs and one for cats. Each staff and student gets to sign up for either the "cat" or "dog" team and put any donations they have in the jar for their team. The team with the most money at the end of the competition will earn a pizza party. All money raised will be donated to Safe Haven.

Albany Options School Garden

From the beginning of the school year AOS has been working to create a school garden to serve as an outdoor classroom and learning environment. It has always been a dream to have a school garden and it is finally becoming a reality!

Back in September Lacey Edmiston, a senior at AOS, measured out the garden space and plotted out where we would put the raised beds. Several months later she designed the beds and built them with the Woods Class, which was the start to the AOS school garden.

Now the raised beds are in the garden and the exciting part begins. With the overwhelming support of community organizations, individuals, and donors, all of the pieces have been coming together so that in March we can begin planting in time for an end of the school year harvest.

Next grading period Mrs. Muller will be teaching Ecology, which will have a strong focus on the garden. The garden will serve as a hands-on Service Learning opportunity, where students will take knowledge from the classroom and apply it to the real world.

Produce from the garden will be used in our Foods classes and the school cafeteria. Excess produce will be available to students to take home and will be donated to local organizations.

To promote a "Green" environment at the school, compost bins will be added to the cafeteria and the staff room, which will be broken down in the garden composter and turned into fertilizer for the garden.

None of this would be possible without the support of the community.

Government Class Visits Oregon State Capital

On Monday, February 27th the American Government Class took a field trip to Salem to visit our State Capitol. The students were given a tour of the Capitol where they learned about the history of the State and of the Capitol building.

During the tour the students had the privilege to observe a Legislative Session and watch as bills were passed and laws were created. Students even had the opportunity to sit in the Governor's chair and have their photo taken. One wrote in a reflection that: "I'm beginning to see politics differently, because I'm learning more and becoming more knowledgeable on politics. I see the State differently because I see they care about the real issues".

Students visited the office of our State Senator,



Frank Morse, who is now scheduled to come visit Albany Options School and discuss issues relevant to the City of Albany. The students will have an opportunity to discuss issues and present solutions with our local representative.

New Electives at AOS

This term Albany Options was very excited to introduce two new elective classes, Music and Art.

Ms. Tverdy, who also teaches Math at AOS, is teaching Music class. The class is focusing on the history of American music, beginning in the colonial days and eventually moving through to modern music of today.

Ms. Johnson, who also teaches art at South Albany High School, is now teaching two periods of Drawing at AOS. This class is an amazing opportunity for many of our students and is allowing them a chance to express themselves artistically. The walls of AOS are now full of beautiful artwork created by students.

We are looking forward to seeing the outstanding work and knowledge students acquire through both of these new elective classes.

AOS Acts at ACT

This Spring the Albany Civic Theater is putting on a production of "High School Musical." AOS is very proud to announce that after three nights of auditions senior Daniel Naylor and Middle and High School teacher Ms. Mitchell were both cast roles; Naylor as Chad, one of the basketball players ,and Ms. Mitchell as a teacher.
