### **Important Information**

#### **Dress Code**

As we enter the warmer months of the school year again, we would like to remind our parents and students to familiarize themselves with the dress code for our school as described in the handbook.

After our most recent second round of snow days, the School Board met

on the 24th and considered four options which included not making up any additional time, making every Wednesday a regular school day (and conducting the Professional Learning Communities later

in the same afternoon), adding 30

minutes to each school day after spring break, and adding days to the end of the

school year.

After careful consideration the Board chose to add days, extending the student school year to a half-day on June 19. The last work day for teachers will be June 20.

The Ecology class has been very busy preparing for the arrival of Spring. The last two months the students have been busy germinating seeds, propagating, watering, and transplanting.

Sunny mornings have been spent outdoors preparing the raised beds, trimming bushes, and planting seeds.

As part of the effort to maintain AOS as a certified wildlife habitat, the

students planted seed mixes, which will provide a natural habitat and food source for hummingbirds, insects, and butterflies.

The students have also spent time learning about endangered species, including the Fender's Blue Butterfly, which is only found in the Willamette Valley. The students are committed to spend-

ing the last portion of the term planting the necessary plants needed for the butterfly's habitat, and spreading the word in a Service Learning project.

The school is also in the process of purchasing a greenhouse in order to expand the Ecology program.

### Miss Kozak's Graphic Novel English Class

Who would have thought that a graphic novel, comic, could be so entertaining, fun and educational?

Well, in Miss Kozak's Graphic Novel class, students have been reading *Persepolis* which is a graphic memoir of a young girl growing up in revolutionary Iran. The story begins in 1980, when Marjane Satrapi is just 10 years old, and the revolution has just begun. Marjane and her family are thrust

into a new fundamentalist Islamic society. Women must wear veils, men shouldn't shave, alcohol and even card games are forbidden.

Miss Kozak and her students alike have a learned a great deal about the political and social changes that have come about in Iran before and after the revolution. They have learned why some people in Iran have disliked the politics of the USA while wanting to emulate our culture. All in all, the students and their teacher have a better understanding of the Iranian people.

Although this is a black and white picture book, the students have been challenged by the vocabulary and the issues.

Most student have agreed that they have learned a lot and have had fun reading *Persepolis*.
