Incorporating Engineering in the Classroom

With the beginning of the new term, Mrs. Gillispies' Chemistry class hits the ground running with a battery engineering challenge. The students were asked to create a device that would hold a battery, two wires, and a light bulb, all while getting the light bulb to work. The students created a wide variety of designs given they had limited materials. The students were

only allowed to use 4 popsicle sticks, 4 paper clips, 4 binder clips a piece of cardboard and hot glue. The students went above and beyond the expectation. One student even created their own battery hold; Henry Spires was very detail oriented in creating a battery holder that really helped his design to work. The students will be using this to learn about the periodic ta-

ble and electrons. At the end of the term the students will be designing and building efficient and functional batteries.
