Students can earn Co-Operative Work Experience elective credits for having a job. See Mrs. Harryman if you have questions. You could earn as much as 2.0 elective credits for work you're already doing!

Students Volunteer in Community

Ms. Fitzpatrick teaches the Team Building elective class every day, where students go out into the community to volunteer and serve.

Once a week the students go to FISH of Albany and help in

the clothes closet by organizing, cleaning, and vacuuming. Some of the students also help outside with yardwork such as laying down mulch or weeding.

On Wednesdays the students run an afterschool club for 3rd through 5th graders at Sunrise Elementary School. After a snack, the elementary students

are paired with AOS students. The students act as mentors to the elementary students.

Twice a week the students go to Regency of Albany Assisted Living Center and help with outdoor cleaning and yard work one day, and spend the other day with the residents playing board games and getting to know them.

Ms. Fitzpatrick said, "the students have been amazing at all of these places. I have received numerous compliments from staff members at all the places we have volunteered at praising our kids for their hard work ethic!"

Classroom Gets Flexible Seating

Mrs. Mitchell and Ms. Fitzpatrick changed the layout of their classroom this year by adding flexible seating options.

In addition to the traditional desks and chairs, they have redesigned their classroom to include a variety of different kinds of chairs including gaming chairs, bean bag chairs, stools, stability balls, and more.

The change was made in an effort to

create a learning environment that better fits their teaching styles as well as the learning styles of the students.

Ms. Fitzpatrick shared that "it has really helped the students focus and be engaged in class. We are all loving it."

Many classrooms

in the school district are starting to switch to flexible seating options. The National Education Association pub-



lished an article last September on the benefits, which Mrs. Mitchell, Ms. Fitzpatrick, and the students are now experiencing in their classes.

AOS Professional Development Focuses on Equity

Superintendent Jim Golden spoke to the whole district on Monday, August 28th, during the Back-to-School District Rally, about the importance of breaking down the barriers of race in our culture and schools.

In sticking with the theme, the teachers and staff at Albany Options School and district administrators spent the morning of Wednesday, August 30th meeting with Dr. Johnny Lake. Dr. Lake kicked off the school year talking about diversity, race and culture,

and equity of learning.

Dr. Lake is an internationally renowned trainer and consultant, and has taught as a professor in the teacher and counseling preparation programs at Northwest Christian University in Eugene. He is an Administrator on

Special Assignment with the Eugene 4J school district. Dr. Lake holds a bachelor's degree in history from

Willamette University, has a Masters

in educational leadership and administration, and received his Ph.D. in educational leadership, policy, management and organization. Dr. Lake is a former chairman of the State of Oregon Commission on Black Affairs.

Dr. Lake is an incredible speaker and left the staff feeling motivated, inspired, and excited to take on the challenges of the new school year. Principal John

> Hunter commented that, "Equity of Learning is paramount to the success of all students. It is not

just a catchy phrase, it is a necessity, and Dr. Lake was able to bring that to a human and personal level that every teacher in the building can bring back to the classroom with them."

Mark Wolfe, with 25 years in public education, was extreme-

ly inspired by Dr. Lake's presentation. "After listening to Johnny Lake, I realized that even with all my years of

experience there's still so much I can

do to be a better teacher." In fact, Mr. Wolfe said that on his second day of his Psychology class this term he implemented a group activity that he learned from Dr. Lake.

Dr. Lake is part of the year-long professional development theme on providing equity of learning. The staff began their focus on this last Spring with guest speakers on providing

equal learning opportunities to at-risk youth, English Language Learners, and Special Education students.

The teachers will continue their work with additional educational leaders in the community to make sure that they are providing our students with the best educational opportunities available
