The AOS Leadership Class took a special focus on Earth Day this year and incorporated many activities and opportunities for the week to bring awareness and change.

The students began by creating recycling and composting signs around the school building as part of the Oregon Green School application process, as AOS works to renew their qualifications.

In addition, the students coordinated a dress up day on Earth Day, sold "dirt cups" as a lunchtime fundraiser, and posted educational posters around the

building on how to be more environmentally friendly and aware.

The Leadership class finished off

the week by coordinating a group of students to go with Mrs. Mitchell to North Albany Park on Saturday, April 23rd, and volunteer with the

SOLVE ivy cleanup at the park, where students removed the invasive species in an attempt to protect the native trees and plants.



Students Calculate Driving Distances While Texting

Many of our math classes are incorporating more task-based activities to help students become better prepared for Smarter Balanced testing.

One of those activities this term was a unit on texting and driving. Students simulated sending a text message while trying to keep



track of short messages being written on the board.

At the same time, another student was timing how long their head was down each time they looked at their phone.

Students were surprised to find that 3 seconds of looking at the phone at 55 mph translated to the better part of a football field

being traveled!

We discussed the importance of being focused on the road, while getting practice on unit analysis and rate of change problems.

Tasks like these are common on the Smarter Balanced test, and students enjoy the chance to do something more applicable and different to their regular math lessons.

This lesson was able to combine an important life lesson with important math skills.

How to Check Student Grades

If you are unsure of your student's progress in a grading period, or in high school in general, please contact our counselor, Kevin DeCoster. He can help you access "Pinnacle", which tracts students' progress on a real-time basis. You can see current grades as well as what assignments are completed or not as long as you have the appropriate password. Any of our

front-desk staff can help you with this.

Mr. DeCoster can also go over students' transcript with you if there are any questions about how close students are to graduating, how many credits they have earned, what classes are still needed, etc.

English Teachers Align Reading Standards for Year

The Common Core State Standards function as a road map for high school teachers: while the standards don't tell teachers what or how to teach, they give teachers a direction to go in, and they ensure that teachers are on the same page.

To that end, it is important to aim instruction toward the standards.

The English Language Arts team has been working towards improving its teaching by using assessments to inform instruction, and Language Arts teacher Lindsay Jansen spoke to the School Board on April 25th to report on their progress.

Common assessments are given at the beginning of each trimester and at the end of the school year in order to evaluate student progress in reading skills.

Each trimester, instruction is focused on a set of target standards, which means that students get the same "big idea" in every English class, regardless of the topic of the class. It also means that teachers can collaborate to improve instructional strategies.

Last year the ELA department spent a great deal of time collaborating to make the common assessment and align them to the standards selected for each trimester.

In evaluating the data from first trimester to second trimester, student growth is apparent. 57% of students improved on standard RL.1, and 78% of students improved on standard RL.2. For the teachers, it is rewarding to see students grow, learn, and achieve.

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New Forensics Science Class Solves First Crime

This term, Mrs. Gillispie introduced a new science class where students learn the science behind forensics! It has turned into a fun and engaging alternative to your traditional science

classes, but students continue to expand their understanding of the standards and sciences.

During the course of the sixweek grading period, students have had the opportunity to learn about chromatography, the science behind blood splatters

and patterns, and bloodwork.

After over a month of learning about forensic sciences, students in Mrs. Gillispie's Forensic Science class put their skills to the test for their final.

A mishap happened with a doll and some scissors and the students had to use their skills to figure out who committed this heinous crime.

The students have been building up their observations skills along with learning techniques used in real


> crimes to solve the mock scenarios in class. For the final the students needed to use their skills in measuring the size of the blood drops to determine

the height they were dripped from and come up with the story of what happened.

Next the students learned about blood types and were able to take "blood samples" from the crime scene and send them to a lab for analysis. Once the four suspects were apprehended, they compared these samples to the suspects to see if there was a match at the crime scene.

Lastly, the students needed to analyze the note left behind at the scene. They learned techniques to figure out whose handwriting might have matched the note as well as how to use chromatography to figure out what pen wrote the note.

Using all of this evidence the students were able to narrow down a suspect in who they think committed this crime. Make sure to ask a forensics student to find out which staff member was guilty.

Seniors Get Ready to Continue Their Education:

Working with Angela Spencer, the GAPS Career and College Readiness Coordinator, the staff of AOS has gotten most of our seniors qualified for the "Oregon Promise" and "Post-Graduate Scholar" Programs. These are the official names for the State of Oregon's funding for students to attend state community colleges. Since most of the living wage jobs in our community require training beyond a high school diploma, we want to make sure that our graduates and GED recipients have opportunities to contin-

ue their training and education, and qualify for careers with employers throughout the Greater Albany area.
