

about several of the
foundational skills
needed to design and
build things, from
small home projects,
to career-level work.

Last year, AOS was awarded a classroom grant from the Albany Public Schools Foundation to purchase some new equipment. When schools closed down, we were-



n't able to use it all as quickly as we had hoped, but now we have a much better setup than in past years. Students will be getting a much better hands-on experience when we get to the project portion of the class.

One of the projects the students have been working on

this term is building new raised beds for Horticulture, which were last built in 2011. The students had to do all of the calculating for materials, measuring,

and ultimately build the beds.

Materials were donated in part by Parr Lumber. They have been great to our school over and over, and this was no exception, especially given how businesses have struggled this last year. On behalf of all of us at Albany Options School, thank you so much. We are so grateful!

It has been fun watching them apply



their math knowledge in a hands-on way this term, giving them skills they will take with them into life beyond school. I am grateful we are able to learn together in-person again and have these hands-on experiences.



Horticulture Revamps Program

Last Spring AOS went into closure due to COVID only 3 days into the trimester, leaving the Horticulture program gardening spaces unattended and neglected for almost two years by the time the Spring term began inperson at the end of this past March.

The students in Horticulture worked incredibly hard this past six-week grading period to get the space back up and running with countless hours

of weeding, reorganizing, and cleaning.

They didn't do it alone! Construction Math, taught by Mr. Corliss built new raised beds (see article on page 3), the local Army recruiters assembled a new green-



house, and the Bark Place donated

wood chips and compost for the garden. Thank you to all of our partners!

In addition, the students have been busy planting vegetable and flower starts. We're excited to see it all come together this final six-week grading period and during summer school!
